Recipe of the Month - Brazilian Chicken and Rice (Galinhada)

The name of the dish is derived from the Portuguese word *galinha*, meaning chicken. Galinhada is a delicious traditional Brazilian dish of chicken and rice. Hearty and comforting, this dish is easy to make, cooked in one pot and great to feed a crowd! *Equipment that is needed: Dutch oven, and food processor.*

Ingredients

FOR THE MARINADE:

- 1 onion, peeled
- 3 garlic cloves, peeled
- ½ cup fresh parsley
- 1 tablespoon ground turmeric
- 1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 cup olive oil
- Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste

FOR THE GALINHADA:

- 1&½ pounds skinless, boneless chicken thighs, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 2 (aprox. 4 ounces) calabresa sausages, sliced (substitute for kielbasa or chorizo)
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 large carrot, finely diced
- ½ cup white wine
- 2 ½ cups chicken broth
- 1 cup white long-grain rice, rinsed
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 Roma tomatoes, chopped
- Salt and freshly ground pepper, to taste
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley

Instructions

MAKING THE MARINADE:

In a food processor, combine all the marinade ingredients and process until smooth.

MAKING THE GALINHADA:

In a bowl, combine the chicken and marinade, tossing so every piece is thoroughly coated. Cover with plastic or foil and refrigerate for at least 2 hours (or overnight).

Heat the olive oil in a large pot or Dutch Oven, over medium heat. Brown the sausage on both sides, about 5 minutes.

Remove sausage with a slotted spoon into a plate and reserve.

Remove the chicken from the marinade, reserving the excess marinade for later.

Add the chicken to the pot, sautéing until lightly browned on all sides, about 10 minutes. Remove from the pot and reserve.

Add more oil if needed, then sauté the onion and carrot until they begin to caramelize slightly, about 5 minutes.

Pour in the wine to deglaze the pan, scraping all the browned bits from the bottom of the pot.

Return the chicken and sausage to the pot, and pour in the chicken broth.

Cover and reduce the heat to medium low. Simmer for 15 minutes.

Add the rice, tomatoes, bay leaves, reserved marinade and a pinch of salt and pepper. Stir to combine.

Cover and continue cooking for another 15 minutes, or until the rice is cooked. There will still be some liquid in the pot, that is normal.

Turn the heat off and let the Galinhada rest, covered, for 10 minutes.

Stir in the fresh parsley and serve!

IWLA National February Issue of Conservation Currents - Summary Highlights

- Wetlands play an essential role in improving water quality, mitigating flooding, and providing critical habitat for fish and wildlife. The Farm Bill presents a meaningful opportunity to protect America's wetlands, and the next one is being drafted now. <u>Urge your members of Congress to protect wetlands in the Farm Bill</u>.
- A year ago, EPA vetoed a plan that would have irreversibly destroyed the pristine waters and extraordinary salmon run of Bristol Bay in Alaska. The League will continue fighting to protect this incredible ecosystem. You can help by telling the Bureau of Land Management to preserve existing protections on 28 million acres of land in Alaska, including 1.25 million acres around Bristol Bay.
- Every year, the League awards [IWLA National] scholarships to college students studying environmental science, natural resource management, and other conservation-related subjects. <u>Applications for the 2024-</u>25 school year are open now.
- In five months, League members from across the country will gather in Cambridge, Maryland, for the 2024 national convention. In the months ahead, the national office and Maryland Division will provide convention-related information via email, in *Outdoor America* magazine, in a printed convention kit, and on the national and Maryland Division websites. Watch for those updates.
