

Recipe of the Month - Cheesy Pumpkin Ricotta Pasta Bake

Servings: 6

Ingredients

- 8 oz. rigatoni or short pasta
- 2 c fresh baby spinach
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 c pumpkin purée
- 1 c ricotta cheese
- 1&1/2 c shredded mozzarella
- 1/2 c parmesan cheese
- 1/2 c heavy cream, or half and half, or milk will work
- 1/3 c vegetable broth
- 1 shallot, diced very small
- 2 to 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 tsp oregano
- 1/4 tsp crushed red pepper
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- 1/2 tsp sea salt
- · Pinch of nutmeg

Instructions

Preheat oven to 375°F.

Cook pasta according to box directions.

While pasta is cooking, add ricotta, egg, 1 cup of the mozzarella, parmesan, broth, cream and pumpkin to a medium bowl and stir until smooth and creamy.

If it is thicker than desired, you can thin it out slightly with more cream or broth.

Add in shallot, garlic and spices and stir to combine.

When pasta is cooked, drain and then toss with the spinach to wilt. Add pasta to the pumpkin ricotta mixture and stir well to coat all of the rotini.

Pour into a small to medium greased casserole dish or a 9×9 greased pan and bake for about 15 minutes or until slight bubbling.

Sprinkle with the rest of the mozzarella and bake another 5-10 minutes or until cheese is melted.

Cool for several minutes before serving.

Store in the refrigerator in an airtight container for about 5 days.

Membership Volunteer Participation

Message from Chapter President Chris Ferguson

The purpose of the Membership Participation Policy is to develop camaraderie with our members and encourage chapter members to participate in chapter activities such as youth events, fundraisers and park workdays. The Board of Directors and I would like to thank the many members who do contribute their time and resources to make this chapter a success and commit to their membership pledge.

The Membership Participation Policy can be found on the chapters website https://sniwla.org/sniwla/ under the Members menu. The policy requires each member to contribute 8 hours of service per year. To receive credit for your hours of service the hours must be submitted by the first of December. Credit hours worked during December will be applied to the following year's requirement.

Our chapter participation policy states that "Service hours may only be acquired by participating in authorized activities" and "The Board of Directors may select alternative options for fulfilling the service hour requirement."

A few members have recorded incidental tasks on the park gate sign-in sheet. Descriptions of the task performed include "picking up sticks" or "picking up brass" (at the range). The board has determined that such tasks are NOT considered appropriate for earning service hours. Independent tasks that do qualify would include mowing the grass, weed whacking the shooting range berms or dam embankment. This is not an all-inclusive list and members can reach out to Jimmy Fanny the Park Maintenance Chair or contact the Board to inquire if another task would qualify for service hours. To contact the Board, you may attend the Board meeting or speak with an officer or board member who can bring the requested task to the attention of the board.

We will continue to extend the courtesy for members who do work at the chapter park outside of scheduled park workdays by placing an "X" in the work column on the gate sign-in sheets. Doing so relieves you of the requirement to fill in a volunteer participation form. As a reminder the Board modified the Participation Policy as of January 1, 2025. For members not completing the required 8 hours of service the participation fee has been increased from \$50 to \$150.

Alpha-Gal - Reminder to Beware of Ticks

In Eastern Virginia, ticks are most active during the warmer months, typically from April through September, with peak activity often occurring in June and July. While they can be active year-round, vigilance to avoid contracting Alpha-Gal with the resulting allergy to red meat is especially important during these warmer months. Q: What is Alpha-gal? Alpha-galactose (galactose-a-1,3-galactose) is a carbohydrate that is present in all mammals except higher primates, such as apes and humans. This carbohydrate is present in mammal meat such as beef and pork, but more importantly for hunters, it's present in wild game including venison, elk, bear, rabbit, squirrels, and other game we pursue here in Virginia. Alpha-gal is not found in fish, reptiles, birds, or people. Dr. Jonathan Mozena, a board-certified allergist and immunologist, said that AGS is where an individual develops an allergy to the carbohydrate present in mammal meat. This is unique because most other allergies—such as a peanut allergy—are an allergy to a protein found in a particular food. "Alpha-gal is unique because it's an allergy to a carbohydrate and not a protein. If a person is allergic to beef, that same individual will react to pork, lamb, bear, deer, and so forth," he said. Another unusual characteristic of the allergy is that while most food allergies occur within minutes of eating, that's not the case with AGS. Allergic reactions to alpha-gal, such as after eating tend to be delayed by nearly four to eight hours. The good news, at least for some, is that not everyone will develop an alpha-gal allergy after being bitten. Mozena said there is likely something genetically different about those who contract the allergy. Ken Dugan's Special Project - Duck and BlueBird Boxes

Not many of our Chapter Members know that, a few years ago, Chapter Ike Ken Dugan took on the responsibility, at the request of the chapter Board of Directors, to maintain the blue bird and duck boxes that are installed around the perimeter of the pond.



Ken says that every year, beginning in the Spring and continuing through the Fall, he checks on these boxes usually at about 2 week intervals, to clean them out, remove

wasp nests, etc. For the duck boxes he also puts in cedar chips. He says it takes about an hour and a half to do the job.

Recently Ken experimented with adding metal plates to the box mounting poles to stop snakes from intruding.

Interestingly, he says he has never seen evidence of ducks using the duck boxes. He suggests he might want to move them further back from the water and mount them much higher up.

Thank you, Ken for furthering one of the chapter's goals to promote wildlife conservation by taking care of our chapter park's bird boxes!

The custom design that Tim devised provides for ventilation, an adequate entry hole, and a swivel cleanout bottom panel. The adults helped the kids with gluing and with straightening out the occasional bent nail.

Chapter Ike Elaine Doxey, with help from event coordinator Chapter Ike Claudia Powell, showed the kids pages from a bird booklet that she had prepared showcasing a variety of native birds in our area and also had them play a match-the bird-name-to-the-picture game. Chapter Park Maintenance *Work Day has been Rescheduled for Saturday, April 19th.

The previously scheduled Park Work Day for Saturday April 12th was canceled due to inclement weather. Consequently, Board Manager/Park Manager *Jimmy Fanny has rescheduled the park workday for April 19th at 8am.*

Members should plan to assemble at the park gazebo to review the work that needs to be done. Tools needed may include mowers, trimmers, leaf blowers, rakes, shovels, chain saws and pruning tools. Please wear heavy work boots and bring gloves, sunscreen lotion, insect repellent, hearing protection, and safety glasses.

There's a lot to be done to spruce up the park for our upcoming April Teddy Bear Hunt the following weekend: priority tasks for this workday include removing leaves from ditches and culverts alongside our driving paths to ensure adequate drainage and of course the usual tasks of mowing and blowing leaves from the gazebo area. Overhanging limbs should be trimmed from around the pond's perimeter and alongside our driving paths as required.

Time permitting, we should yank out all pine saplings from the dam's front and back surfaces. Also, grass can be trimmed from the dam's surfaces, but for removal of hardwood saplings please coordinate with Jimmy to receive guidance on the preferred method for doing that.
