Recipes of the Month - Casseroles for Zucchini and Squash



<u>Cheesy Zucchini Casserole</u> (Low Carb & Keto-Friendly) *Source Credit <u>Katerina, Diethood.com</u>* Servings : 6

Ingredients

Instructions

- 2 to 3 zucchini, sliced into half moons about 1/4-inch thick (you will need 6 cups total)
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/3 cup heavy cream
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 3 to 4 garlic cloves, minced (or 1 tablespoon minced garlic)
- 1 teaspoon dried basil
- 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon fresh ground pepper
- 1 1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- 2 tablespoons butter, sliced into 1/4-inch thick pieces
- chopped fresh parsley, for garnish

Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease a 9-inch baking dish with butter. Add the sliced zucchini to the baking dish and sprinkle with salt; mix and set aside.

In a mixing bowl whisk together the heavy cream, eggs, parmesan cheese, garlic, basil, nutmeg, and ground pepper.

Layer 1/2 cup of shredded cheddar cheese over the zucchini.

Pour the prepared cream sauce over the zucchini and scatter pieces of butter over the zucchini and sauce. Bake for 25 minutes.

Remove from oven and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake for 7 to 10 more minutes, or until bubbly, browned, and zucchini is tender.

Remove from oven and let stand 10 minutes. Garnish with parsley; Cut and serve.



Squash Casserole

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 4 cups sliced yellow squash
- 1 medium onion chopped
- 2 large eggs
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 1 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- ¹/₂ teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1 sleeve Ritz crackers

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350° F.

Melt 2 TBLSP butter in medium skillet.

Add squash and onions and cook until tender.

To a large bowl, add eggs and lightly whisk.

Add cheese and milk and whisk into egg.

Add cooked squash, onions to mixture and stir.

Melt remaining 2 TBLSP butter in skillet.

Add to squash casserole mixture.

Add salt, pepper and cayenne pepper (optional).

Stir well.

Spray 9×13 casserole dish with cooking spray. Pour squash casserole mixture into baking dish.

Top evenly with crushed Ritz crackers.

Place in preheated oven and bake 45 minutes (until top has lightly browned). Allow to sit for about 3 minutes before serving.

July Chapter Dinner Meeting Guest Speaker



The guest speaker for the July member's meeting was Nick Delphia. Nick is the president of the Beekeepers Guild of Southeastern Virginia. His presentation was titled " Elevating the Standards of Beekeeping".

The Guild is a 501(3)(c) nonprofit organization established in 2009 to promote education amongst members and the general public on the importance of honeybees and other pollinators. Goals of the organization include promoting sustainable beekeeping through continuing education, mentoring of new beekeepers and explaining the dangers involved with the overuse of pesticides. The Guild has developed a "Nucleus" program raising their own "survivor stock" of

bees to maintain and increase the local supply of bees thereby discouraging importing of bees and they provide swarm removal and relocation, pollination services, and beginner beekeeping classes. For more information on the Guild see <u>BeeKeepersGuild.org</u>.

Conservation Legislation News - Bill Filed to Repeal Pittman-Robertson

Recently, Georgia Congressman [Andrew Clyde] introduced a bill to repeal Pittman-Robertson Act excise taxes. If passed, the bill could deprive state agencies of much-needed conservation dollars. For 85 years, the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, also known as the Pittman-Robertson Act, has raised billions of dollars for wildlife research and habitat acquisition. The bill, which is funded by a 10 to 11 percent excise tax on hunting and fishing gear, including firearms, is arguably the most important source of conservation funding in the United States.

With <u>H.R. 8167</u>, Representative Andrew Clyde of Georgia has taken aim at Pittman-Robertson's current funding in the name of Second Amendment rights. The bill is named the "RETURN (Repealing Excise Tax on Unalienable Rights Now) our Constitutional Rights Act of 2022". It would eliminate the excise tax on guns, ammunition, and archery tackle that fund Pittman-Robertson. He introduced the bill ... with the support of 53 co-sponsors ...

Last year, Pittman-Robertson and the Sportfish Restoration Act, known as Dingell-Johnson, combined to <u>bring in \$1.5 billion for conservation</u>. Currently, those funds go into a USFWS account called the Wildlife Restoration Trust Fund. Some of the money is earmarked for Hunter Education, target range construction, and projects that require cooperation among several states. The bulk of the money is divided among the 50 states based on each state's land area and the number of paid hunting and fishing license holders.

IWLA National Convention July 19th-22nd Recap

Message (condensed) from Vicki Arnold, IWLA National President"

... At the IWLA National's 100th anniversary convention, Ikes enjoyed camaraderie with fellow conservationists, heard from outstanding quest speakers, and charted a path for our second century... Rick Swan, executive director of the East Peoria Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the League back to Illinois... League Vice President Jodi Arndt Labs ... encouraged every Ike to learn about one incredible accomplishment from our past and to share that achievement with others as a way of promoting the League and propelling us into the future. Executive Director Scott Kovarovics highlighted recent achievements, including the growth of membership over the past two years and the expansion of our volunteer science programs... League President Vicki Arnold introduced our vision for our second century, which focuses on engaging more Americans in community-based conservation and volunteer science, advocating for sound public policy to protect America's natural resources for future generations, and connecting people to the natural world. Clean Water Program Director Samantha Briggs gave examples of League volunteers who go above and beyond by putting out an informational sign while they're doing community science... George Venable, Chair of the Rifle and Pistol Committee at the Lynchburg (Virginia) Chapter, spoke about how chapters can engage people by introducing them to shooting sports and by partnering with Scout groups to reach youth. Annette Hansen, Executive Director of the Porter County (Indiana) Chapter, gave a brief overview of the importance of creating partnerships...

League chapters, members, volunteers and partners were recognized [with awards] for accomplishments in conservation, youth engagement, shooting sports and other areas of excellence. [A panel discussion was held on] ... responses to Climate Change... A panel of experts discussed options from conservation across large landscapes to industrial storage of electricity generated by solar, wind and other renewable resources. Dr. Imre Gyuk, Director of Energy Storage Research, U.S. Department of Energy, stressed that to address the climate crisis, transportation, building systems, agriculture and manufacturing will have to run on electricity that comes from renewable energy... Chris Gloninger, Chief Meteorologist at KCCI TV in Des Moines, reviewed the science of climate change, pointing out that based on long-term cycles, the planet should be cooling now... Emily Rodriguez, the League's Agriculture Outreach Coordinator, spoke about the importance of sustainable agricultural practices... Olympic gold medalist Ginny Thrasher, who got her start in shooting sports at the League's Arlington-Fairfax Chapter, joined us via video to share her personal story and offer some tips for engaging new audiences in shooting sports... Dr. Montgomery, co-author of What Your Food Ate: How to Heal Our Land and Reclaim Our Health, gave a stimulating and well-received tour through the connection between soil health and human health... Darlene Cavalier, founder of SciStarter, shared her perspective on the future of volunteer science and helped the League prepare to leverage this work to protect the environment and engage more Americans in conservation.

By unanimous vote, the League members present at convention elected a slate of national officers: National President - Vicki Arnold, National Vice President - Jodi Arndt Labs, National Secretary - Jim Storer, National Treasurer - Scott Meyer, Directors-At-Large - Richard Sommer and Bill Kelly. The Endowment Board elected Steve Labs (WI), Lisa McIntyre (IA) and Gary Schwartz (MN) for three-year terms. Annette Hansen (IN) was elected for a one-year term. Ikes in attendance elected Jill Padgette (VA), Rick Cerwick (IA) and Dale Braun (IA) to the Executive Board.

Following clarifying questions and debate, delegates voted unanimously to adopt a change to the League's bylaws that would give the Executive Board more flexibility to propose a new logo for the organization.... Delegates voted to adopt resolutions regarding protections for ephemeral streams and wetlands, conservation of native non-game fish, and technologically enhanced naturally occurring radioactive material... the League membership voted not to adopt a resolution related to rural electric cooperatives ... Last but not least, today we voted on the location of a future convention. In July 2025, we will gather in Green Bay, Wisconsin. I can't wait to see you there!"
